Authority and Purpose. (2) "Comprehensive Administration of Credentials for Teachers in Utah Schools" or "CACTUS" means the electronic file maintained on all licensed Utah educators including information such as: (a) personal directory information: (b) educational background; (c) endorsements; (d) employment history; and (e) a record of disciplinary action taken against the educator. (3) "Endorsement" means a designation on a license area of concentration earned through demonstrating required competencies established by the Superintendent that qualifies the individual to: (a) provide instruction in a specific content area; or

(b) apply a specific set of skills in an education setting.

248	that applies for the license and meets all requirements in this Section R277-301-6.

251	(3) The general requirements for a professional educator license shall include:
