> There are 4,990 total agencies who employ police and sheriff's patrol officers in local, state, and federal agencies throughout Utah.¹

> Police candidates must be U.S. citizens, usually at least 21 years old, and able to meet rigorous physical and personal qualifications.²

> Nationwide, employment of police and detectives is projected to grow 3 percent through the year 2032.²

> Most firefighters receive training at a fire academy, pass written and physical tests, and hold an emergency medical technician (EMT) certification.²

> Nationwide, employment of firefighters is projected to grow 4 percent through the year 2032.²

> Nationwide, women represent 3.9 percent of firefighters, compared to 14.4 percent of women who are employed as police officers.³
