Advice to Students: Utah high school seniors were asked, "What advice would you offer to future students about taking CTE courses during high school?

"I am so thankful for the opportunities the CTE classes offered me in high school. The classes were so valuable because they helped me find my passion and help me choose a career. I am going to college with a clear plan.

"The advice I would offer to future CTE students is simply to embrace the CTE experience. First, I would tell students to not only pick classes they are interested in, but to also pick classes that they don't know if they're interested in.



Second, I would tell students to not be afraid of challenging themselves. Through challenges you discover new skills, you have new experiences, and you learn something about yourself. Finally, I would tell students to build relationships with teachers and staff. They are experts in their field, and they are passionate about what they are teaching. They want to share their passion and they want their students to succeed."
